Summer Highlights

Midsummer Eve

Midsummer is the one of the most popular festivals in Scandinavia. It is a celebration of the Summer solstice, the longest day of the year, and takes place on the weekend that falls between June 20th and June 26th.

The celebration of the Summer solstice is a very ancient practice, dating back to pre-Christian times. Many of today's customs have evolved from pagan times to when Midsummer was a fertility festival with many rituals associated with nature and the hope for a good harvest in the fall. Tribute was paid to the powers of the sun god with bonfires signifying the defeat of darkness.

Similar to most Scandinavian traditions and celebrations, meeting friends and family is as important as having plenty to eat on the table. Midsummer traditional delicacies are fresh potatoes with pickled herring or smoked fish from the nearby lake, the first strawberries of the season for desert, and some schnapps and beer to wash down the herring.

In Sweden people make flower garlands for their hair and home, dance around a decorated midsummer pole, while listening to traditional folk songs. Another tradition includes girls picking seven kinds of flowers, and while doing so, crossing seven fences. Then the flowers are placed underneath their pillow to bring dreams about their future prince. In Norway and Denmark Midsummer Eve is celebrated with large bonfires. Danes, head for the beach, for picnics and songs. Witches are made of straw and burned on the bonfires as a remembrance of the witch burnings of the 16th and 17th centuries.

Among Danes and Norwegians Midsummer Eve is known as Sankthansaften, or St. John's Eve, and is celebrated on the eve of June 23rd. In Norway, Midsummer's Eve is also called "Jonsok", which means "John's wake," important in Catholic times with pilgrimages to churches and holy springs

In Finland, before 1316, the summer solistice was called Ukon Juhla after the Finnish god Ukko. When Finland was Christianized, the holiday was named Juhannes after John the Baptist (Johannes) in order to give a Christian meaning to the pagan holiday.

Fjallkona

On June 17th, 1944, Iceland regained its independence from Denmark and became the Republic of Iceland and Icelanders all over the world rejoiced. Ever since huge crowds gathers at the parliament building in Reykjavik by the statue of Jón Sigurðsson, the leader in Iceland's independence struggle.

On June 17th flags fly from every flag pole in Iceland and in every city, town, village and hamlet people come together to celebrate with parades, speeches, athletic competitions and dances. In Icelandic communities all over the world the Fjallkona, the Maid of the Mountain, is presented as the symbol of Iceland's natural grandeur and the spirit of her children.
