Scandinavian Languages

Danish, Norwegian (Bokmål) and Swedish are closely related languages, and those who speak one of them understand the others to a certain extent. In addition, all three languages have many dialects.

Faroese and Icelandic are also related to these languages but cannot be immediately understood by Danes, Finns, Swedes or Norwegians. The only exception to this is a few people who speak certain dialects in western Norway. Faroese and Icelandic speakers understand each other without great difficulty.

Faroese, Icelandic and medieval Norwegian belong to the western Scandinavian languages, while Danish and Swedish belong to the eastern Scandinavian languages. Swedish is also spoken on the Åland Islands and along certain coastal regions of Finland. Danish is the official language in Greenland and to a certain extent on the Faroe Islands.

Finnish belongs to a completely different language family than the other Nordic languages. Some researchers consider the Sami language, which is spoken by an ethnic group which lives in the northern areas of Finland, Norway, Sweden and Russia, to be related to Finnish.

On the other hand, Finnish speakers do not understand Sami. Greenlandic is also totally different from the other Nordic languages.
